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The Graduate School is committed to ensuring program accessibility for people with disabilities.

Submission of this information is voluntary. The information which the Graduate School obtains shall be kept strictly confidential, except that (1) first aid, safety, University and Security personnel may be informed, when and to what extent appropriate, if the condition might require emergency treatment, and (2) government officials investigating compliance with the Act shall be informed.

The general provisions of the regulations define a person with a disability as follows:

Someone who (1) has a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities (i.e., functions such as caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning and working); (2) has a record of such an impairment (i.e., has a history of mental or physical impairment or had been misclassified as having such); (3) is regarded as having such an impairment (i.e., has a physical or mental impairment that does not substantially limit major life activities but is treated by the University as having such a limitation; or, has an impairment which limits major life activities only as a result of others toward such an impairment; or has no impairment - as defined by the regulations - but is treated by the University as having an impairment).

If you have a disability, please consider filling out the questionnaire on the back of this sheet. The purpose of the questionnaire is to help the University in general, and the Graduate School in particular, make reasonable accommodation for students with disabilities so that programs and services are accessible to them.
