The University offers many services that support graduate students. To assist you in locating these opportunities and resources, the [Graduate School's Access, Diversity, and Inclusion team](#) has developed this guide.

All of these resources are available for graduate students. Some are only for graduate students and others are available to other campus populations as well. The resources are grouped by broad area.

ACADEMIC

- **Academic/learning consultations** – The McGraw Center is newly offering a pilot program of one-on-one individualized learning (“academic coaching”) consultations to graduate students. Contact Nic Voge (nvoge@princeton.edu).
- **Free research books** – If you need a book for your research, you may request that Firestone Library purchase it. They can notify you when the book is available: <http://library.princeton.edu/help/recommend-purchase>
- **e-journals** - Access a massive number of journal articles from any computer in the world: https://getit.princeton.edu/journal_list
- **Academic articles emailed to you** – If you need an academic article that is not available electronically, you can submit a request through “Article Express” and the Library will scan and email it to you (great if you are working remotely): <https://library.princeton.edu/services/article-express>
- **Expert librarian consultation** – Almost every academic field has an assigned Princeton librarian (who usually holds a PhD in the discipline) who is willing to meet with you one-on-one to share relevant resources: <https://library.princeton.edu/staff/specialists>
- **Digital humanities working group** – If you’re interested in the digital humanities, there is a Graduate Student Collaboratory to develop projects in a community of peers. Meets Wednesdays from 4:30-6:00pm: <https://cdh.princeton.edu/community/grad-caucus-collaboratory/>

- **Get access to private space in Firestone Library** – To request a locker where you can leave your books or to access study spaces for designated departments: <http://library.princeton.edu/services/firestone-graduate-study-rooms>
- Request academic accommodation - For students who wish to self-identify a disability and request an academic accommodation from the Office of Disability Services. TECHNOLOGY

- **Laptop purchases** - The Student Computer Initiative (SCI) is a program that offers laptop computers that are specially priced for Princeton students and pre-installed with software for academic use at Princeton, supported by Office of Information Technology staff, and offered with a three-year warranty: <https://iss.princeton.edu/sci>

- **CST StudioLab**: The StudioLab is a versatile, welcoming, and engaging space for collaboration and creation across disciplines. TEACHING

A key role many doctoral students play is as an Assistant in Instruction (i.e. a TA, section leader, or preceptor) for courses taught by faculty members. In addition,

there are other roles for graduate students to play in teaching/mentoring undergraduates and other populations.

FUNDING

There are a wide variety of funding sources available to graduate students. This site lists funding for graduate student research, internships, conferences, and group activities. The site does not list support for external scholarships/research support, salaries/jobs, prizes, or emergency assistance. In this section, we list a select number of commonly used funding sources that are available to all/most graduate students.

FUNDING FOR ACADEMIC WORK

- **Partial 6th year fellowship** – The Dean’s Completion Fellowship provides fall semester support for humanities and social science students in DCE1 status (sixth academic year). The funding provides a full stipend for the fall semester and the DCE fee. Students who finish their FPO in the fall will be eligible to be appointed as a Postgraduate Research Associate through the Dean of the Faculty: <https://gradschool.princeton.edu/costs-funding/funding-sources/deans-completion-fellowshipppgra-program>
- **Present a scholarly research paper** – For G3-DCE1 students to present a paper during the academic year (up to \$600):

OTHER FUNDING

- **Programming about identity and difference** – Support for student-initiated programming centered on concepts of identity, intersectionality, difference, social constructs, inclusion, solidarity and dialogical pedagogy. LOANS

- **Cost of attendance loans** – Only for U.S. citizens and permanent residents. Typically for students with dependents or other costs that exceed regular attendance:

HOUSING

- **Graduate housing room draw guide** - Graduate Room Draw takes place each spring and designates rooms to students for the following academic year. In the beginning of the spring semester you will receive emails announcing important room draw dates and deadlines.

- **Hardship housing** - Hardship Housing is a process by which returning students who wish to be considered for exception to our general policies may apply for on campus housing. Students may qualify for Hardship Housing due to personal or extenuating circumstances, financial hardship, or some other type of hardship, or because they may not be successful in Room Draw. If approved, a student may receive priority placement over other returning students via this process. Hardship housing application date will be posted each spring prior to the Room Draw.
- **Housing accommodations** - For graduate students with a disability or seeking medical accommodation for their housing request:

- **Child birth/adoption support** – Graduate students who become parents may be eligible for a 12-week suspension of academic work and/or an additional semester of enrollment and stipend:

- **Partial childcare reimbursement** – Provides up to \$5,000 for each of up to two pre-kindergarten aged children for reimbursable childcare expenses (e.g. day care, nanny, babysitter). Based on household income, the reimbursement is taxable:

- **Backup care** – If your regular childcare provider is unavailable (planned or unplanned at the last minute), you may be eligible for up to 100 hours of subsidized childcare per calendar year (you pay \$4/hour for care in your home and \$2/hour for your child to go to a day care center). You must be signed up for this benefit before you need it:

HEALTH/WELL-BEING

GENERAL RESOURCES

- **Confidential assistance/referrals** – The University has a contract with Carebridge which can provide assistance to graduate students for managing work, personal, or family issues including support for childcare, elder care, adoption, time management, financial management, stress and depression, grief and loss, drug/alcohol abuse. You have access to unlimited telephone counseling sessions and telephone referrals. - **Ombuds Officer** – The Ombuds is a neutral, confidential, independent and informal resource where any member of the Princeton community can discuss a complaint, conflict, or problem. The Ombuds Officer listens, helps to bring forth a greater understanding of the problem and possible solutions, looks for information applicable to the situation, and provides coaching and training: <https://www.princeton.edu/ombuds/>
- **Sexual misconduct support** – Students who have experienced interpersonal violence and abuse—including sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating/domestic violence, and stalking—may contact SHARE to help make informed decisions and obtain the help they need. PHYSICAL HEALTH
